





Corruption Exposed at Local Elementary School Principal Accused of Rigging Democratic Election

Every year, the fifth grade class of a Kalamazoo county public elementary school holds a democratic election to decide the color of their class t-shirts. The colors offered this year were orange, gray, green, and safety green: an ugly, despicable yellowish color that is hardly a green at all. However, the safety green ended up winning the election. The results of the election were not released.

Later, fifth grade students conducted loose surveys and found that few students liked, or voted for, the color. With the support of a few teachers, the group demanded that the principal release the election results publicly with this anonymous letter:

(Principal),

My friends and I would like to know what the percentage of the (school's name) shirts is. We did a pole of my class and we would like to know the percentage of who voted for what. We also had an idea that Fifth grade could do a news paper that had scores of the track and field meet and comics. Thank you,

Another local school also suspiciously had the same color shirts at their track and field meet, which suggests that the color was on sale and cheap for both schools to buy.

It remains to be known whether or not the election was indeed as falsified as those in modern-day Russia, but the ongoing investigation itself did empower the fifth graders involved and gave them real-world experience in questioning authority, grassroots organizing, and cultivating a culture of resistance as they head this year to their next indoctrination camp: middle school.

I'm not talking about reacting brutally to brutal oppression. I'm talking about highly focused reseizure of authority. We have biological rights that extend beyond the bullet points laid out under the capitalistic regime. These are rights to determine our own lives based on human values, not monetary symbols. As we struggle to tend the roses that go w/ our bread, we fight for many species, and the planet itself. Let's shout in the streets and expand our network of affinity groups!

When overthrowing the machine, we'll remember to ineract with adversaries & different people with respect and integrity. Cops & corporate fat cats are oppressed by the systems they themselves maintain. In worst case scenarios, their passions and interests sizzle on the back burner as they beat themselves up, as they have less time for things they love(d). They are instead committed to someone else's ratace for mortgage payments and power. Their passions probably got distilled to spectator sports and fine dining. Obviously this is a generalization, but they are responsible for allowing themselves to be so



A positive response to this is to fight for a liberated, inspired, and cooperative world. Confining systems need to be scrapped. Prescribed cycles of life that dom'rserveus need to be restructured. It sucks to sayso, but in order to re realize liberation, there will be violence.

Empathic Insurrection

Empathy is the newest buzzword falling from ivory towers, think tanks, and laboratories from Princeton to Oxford. The general consensus of these pocket-protected intellectuals is what anarchists, punks, romantics, aesthetics, environmentalists, punks, romantics, and spiritually minded folk have been rioting, rhyming, painting, om-shantaing, and occupying for all along. We need to take care of each other and our home planet first and foremost.

Jeremy Rifkin would be pissed if he saw his name in this publication, but whatever. Even though he is a capitalist, he wrote a really long book called The Empathic Civilization. The ideas are summed up well in an RSA animation. Rifkin shows that humans and other creatures with well developed frontal cortexes are soft wired for empathy (the ability to feel for another's plight and share in another's excitement). Rifkin traces the development of empathic identification from blood ties to tribal affiliation to religious ties. The newest empathic border that people identify with is that of the nation state. Like all man surveyed boundaries, the nation state relies on the citizen's belief in the entity, or it ceases to exsist. Rifkin is confident that, as communication and inter-connection grow. technology will enable people to stretch their empathic ties to include all denizens of earth: as well as earth itself.

Extending empathy is a psychological practice that can educate those who are integrated into the systems of competition and domination. It offers and alternative to the pain and disappointment brought on by competition. It helps to remember and focus on why we struggle to live a liberated life. For me, it's to escape from oppressive traditions and to emerge into a more understanding, sensible, and beautiful world. This cannot be done without others.

A Short History: Then and Now

In 1827, a Cincinnati man named Josiah Warren opened the first Time Store where goods could be purchased at cost plus an equal exchange of labor from the customer and the storekeeper. This cost principal stopped all haggling and promoted mutual respect and confidence in place of sharp dealing and distrust. Josiah Warren is also considered to be the first American anarchist.

The Kalamazoo Neighbor ExChange TimeBank values all work equally and is measured by the time you spend doing the task. Our first year we stayed small, about 15 of us, exchanging gardening, rides, community work, cooking, painting, you name it! Since January 2012, we've grown to 35 members and new members are added each month. Our plan is to have members from every neighborhood in the Township of Kalamazoo and eventually to include all of the county.

While you scream at empty buildings surrounded by smiling police, we are infiltrating your march; and smuggling our supplies in from behind the police lines. The end of your march marks the begginning of our rebelling... or so we thought.

The "Black Hurricane Collective" issued a bold call to infiltrate the big permitted NATO protest in order to break-away and advance for a direct and confrontational march. Two smaller groups in black clad moved patiently down the permitted route. Numbers started to grow, yellow t-shirts turned into black hoodies. 3/4's the way through the permitted march the two groups rushed together forming a bloc; and meaner police, with more equipment, arrived almost instantly. The bloc arrived at the permits end, rallied numbers, and made their attempt to break free.

After about a block and a half of dis-organized efforts to form lines, the anarchists were headed off by one line of police; spreading only half-way across the road. Members of the main-stream media covered the other half of the road. The slanting formation the police were forming are typically used to redirect a crowds movement away from a place of interest, not to halt a march.



With little reprisal, the bloc regressed; headed back to the barricade-lined permitted march (and two platoons of police), the confrontational anarchists forfeited their only opportunity to to break-off as a black bloc and take the streets. And the police repression followed.

Now, instead of a single line in front of the bloc, they became surrounded and the number of police grew at an intimidating rate. Some of those in black clad chose to "de-bloc" as to bide their time and remain active later in the day, and others chose to stay and hold their ground.



Afroyim v. Rusk- "once vested by birth or naturalization, may not be taken away... without (the citizens) assent: 'In our country, the people are sovereign and Government cannot sever its relationship to the people by taking away their citizenship,"

Vance v. Terrazas (1980) - "in the final analysis, expatriation depends upon the will of the citizen rather than on the will of Congress and its assessment of his conduct"

This bill has only been introduced at this point in time, it has not yet come to a vote. There were 40,000 new laws in 2011. If we educate eachother, write our congressman, and teach our brothers and sisters; there is time to stop this attack on liberty!

"Educate and inform the whole mass of the people... They are the only sure reliance for the preservation of our liberty."

A War On Liberty

This January, Senator Joe Lieberman (I-CT, most recently noted for sponsering s.2038 "the Stock Act" and then opening the floor questioning the language) and Congressman Charles Dent (R-PA) both introduced legislation to empower the federal government to dispossess citizens of their citizenship and send the into stateless exile. Introduced as S.1698 in the senate and as H.R. 3166 in the House of Representatives, the Enemy Expatriation Act is expressly designed to "add engaging or supporting hostilities against the United States to the list of acts for which United States nationals would lose their nationality."

S. 1698 and H.R. 3166 make it appear that any citizen "engaging in, or purposefully and materially supporting hostilities against the United States" would lose his/her citizenship.

To give some perspective, let's look where we are now. Six out of seven current acts require renunciation of citizenship, or "an unmistakably demonstrating actfor another country." These new bills would change to a newly minted offense, the commission or possible intent to renounce citizenship, on suspicion. Under current law there must be a criminal act; this again would fall into suspicion. This law means that government need only to prove by "preponderance of the evidence" that a person "engaged in, or purposefully and materially support(ed) hostilities against the United States."

Hostilities- "any conflict subject to the laws of war."

So, potentially with this law, someone protesting NATO (who is a Muslim) could be in jeopardy of being charged with committing an expatriating act set forth in these two bills.

With our tails between our legs, we found an impetuous determination to liberate the streets.

After an unsuccessful attempt to orchestrate a break-off march in the 90° Chicago heat, there was a sense of defeat amoungst the radical elements of the protests. As the sun moved across the sky, and the temperature dropped, an impromptu march quickly gained one-thousand participants. Snaking through Chicago's corporate shopping epicenter; the march picked up speed and momentum as more and more people joined in.

The forces of control scrambled in efforts to contain the bitter masses, who were now running to intersections as to head off any attempt to quell their keen impulses.

After a notable display of the peoples ability to take spontaneous, effective action; an occupation was underway.


The occupation endured threats of the infamous "L-RAD", as the state began to show it's true face. WIKILEAKS AND FREE SPEECH

I would like to make an argument for free speech on behalf of Wikileaks, a not-for-profit that has spurred global revolution. I think the argument is timeless and something nearly everyone can agree on, if they're willing to think. Free speech should be absolute. According to the first amendment to the constitution of the United States,

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

Don't get me wrong. Constitutionally I am a strict deconstructionist, in that the constitution, the Federalist Papers, and many other early national documents were created to protect the wealth and power of the moneyed elite, and their dominion over women, slaves, and the poor. (If not as a stated purpose, at least in effect.) I also reject the notion of nationalism as divisive and destructive of human solidarity. But even tea-partiers can agree that the constitution should take precedence over the laws.

However, our government's (global!) suppression of speech, they claim, is protected by what? Ah, yes. The Espionage Act of 1917. An act used to round up socialists, anarchists, and other political dissidents who were trying to feed poor people during World War I. Hyperbole, yes. But true nevertheless.

One of these dissidents was Charles Shenk, who sent out 15,000 leaflets supporting opposition to the draft. The leaflets said things like, "Do not submit to intimidation", "Assert your rights", "If you do not assert and support your rights, you are helping to deny or disparage rights which it is the solemn duty of all citizens and residents of the United States to retain," and so on. He opposed the draft, saying that forced servitude was illegal according to the thirteenth amendment (which made slavery illegal). Right on, Charles Shenk! Although maybe cool it with the citizenry talk.

So the feds basically came up with the idea, over time, that free speech was not protected when it presented "clear and present



On Wednesday, May 16th Brent Betterly (24) Jared Chase (27) and Brian Church (20) were arrested and charged with possession of an explosive or incendiary device, conspiracy to commit terrorism and providing material support to terrorism. This all stems from a harassing traffic stop the activists caught on tape, and released the video- embarrassing the officers who had pulled them over. Pinkney plans to file a suit.

danger." Apparently free speech constitutes clear and present danger. To feds and capitalists. I would tend to agree. This was the legal precedent which served as the first concrete, contemporary stifling of free speech, known as Shenk vs. United States.


(For early examples see the Alien and Sedition Acts and Madison's Federalist Paper 10. Written rather disingenuously under the pseudonym "Publius" - the public, Federalist Paper 10 describes how the federal government must protect the minority (i.e. capitalist) class from the wishes of the majority. This is a historical argument taken up by Howard Zinn in his People's History of the United States.)


In 1969 Brandenburg vs. Ohio effectively raised the protection of free speech to "imminent lawless action," although "enemy combatants" are still held to the original (1919) interpretation of the Espionage Act. Interestingly, Noam Chomsky points out that the act can only be invoked when it concerns the "national defense." Since all the wars we now fight are aggressive foreign wars, the Espionage Act really shouldn't be applied to any information concerning our foreign military presence to begin with, meaning they should revert to Brandenburg vs. Ohio in their legal analysis.

Clearly the first amendment has never been properly defended by the courts. Like many historical developments, the truth of its sentiment is validated insofar as speech is protected. We haven't been doing the footwork, and this has to change.

A bit of rare factual information about Wikileaks:

Wikileaks is an anti-secrecy website which calls itself a not-for-profit organization. Since its inception, Wikileaks has released various diplomatic and governmental information about the illicit affairs of government and corporate entities, from the Iraq War Logs, to the Global Intelligence Files, to the Afghan War Diary and leaks about the detainees (still) being held at Guantanamo Bay. Wikileaks produced Collateral Murder, a short film which documents the firsthand account of a gunner spraying a crowd of supposed insurgents, all of whom were presumably innocent, one of whom was a journalist carrying a



Wikileaks has projected the cause of anti-secrecy and open governance to a new level. It is a company that has studiously stood up for free speech, for freedom of the press, and against censorship. For that, we applaud. Above and beyond, Wikileaks has had a direct effect on both the Arab Spring and Occupy Wall Street, one movement fighting illegitimate governments and the other the illegitimate influence of corporations in the public sphere. From Tunisia to Kalamazoo we have seen up close and with pornographic severity the diabolical interests of corporations like Lockheed Martin, Stratfor, Dow Chemical, and the major banks. The morally bankrupt manuevering of State Department officials and presidents.

The reason I embark with you upon this parade of death and destruction is not for shock purposes. Free speech exists inasmuch as we protect it. A company called Wikileaks is fighting for your speech, the only way that has ever mattered: by speaking truth to power, so righteously, with such indignation and reckless abandon that governments and corporations had to silence them.
